SOME THOUGHTS OF THE WHYS AND WHEREFORES OF KATA

Over the years there have been many discussions of what the Koryu's are supposed to be all about. It is said that Professor Tomiki had very little if any input in how these were designed or what techniques were included... Others say that they were all the product of Oba Sensei and it was an attempt to keep the traditional techniques alive. There are even those who say that the Koryu's have nothing to do with the current system of Tomiki Aikido.

Having tried to analyse these five sets of techniques I have set out below my thoughts on the matter. Others may have their own ideas and I am sure that like me they would be very interested to read these

The Korvu Dai Ichi

My theory about this kata is that it was an attempt to keep the interest of those who had

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reached the end of their competition life or had some disability that did not allow them to compete any longer but still wished to study. It may also have been an attempt to keep the interest of those who simply wanted to look deeper into the activity

Koryu Dai Ni

Here again may I suggest that this was designed for those who were passed competition age or were carrying various injuries to perhaps to their back or joins but still wished to continue practising. Perhaps this is why there is no suwari-waza in this kata.

I also considered another aspect of the kata and that was that there are quite a number of techniques where the hips play a strong part in the application of the techniques.

Koryu Dai San (Also known as the Go-shin-no-kata of aikido)

This may I suggest was as a result of Professor Tomiki's involvement with other senior teachers of the Kodokan,. in the development of the Judo-go-shin-jutsu-no-kata I heard somewhere a long time ago that this set of 21 techniques were developed at the request of the then American Air force chief of staff who asked that some form of Self defence be taught to his people.

Koryu Dai Yon (Also known as the Aikido Nage-no-kata)

When we look at this kata, it is taught in three separate sections.

- 1. The 7 techniques of the Shishi-no hon.
- 2. The 7 techniques of the Ura-waza to the Shishi-no-hon
- 3. The last set, which consists of 6 techniques, each followed by an Ura-waza

This kata has always given me cause for thought because if each technique has a suggested Ura-waza then why is it taught in three separate sections. Further more why are there only eleven techniques in the third section. Surely there should either be 10 or 12. Also I will always wonder why the whole kata is not taught in sequence.

Koryu Dai Go

This kata is I believe is simply a group of techniques designed to improve the students skills in speed, timing and the use of weapons.

Korvu Dai Roku

Here again I feel the same applies.


Finally
